Wilde Lake Middle School has kept in step with the county department of education on program ming for the gifted. A summer workshop helped inform a committee of teachers and administrators of the county progress on identification of the gifted and experimental programs already in operation. The Wilde Lake committee has already spent many hours identifying gifted students in the major subject areas. Work is also being done on identification of the gifted in the fine arts. The first in-service program for teachers was used to inform the total staff of county goals and school progress for the gifted. This high interest and motivation by the staff has already been rewarded. A recent letter form the department of education has informed Mr. Jones that Wilde Lake Middle School will be one of eleven schools in the county to incorporate specific programming for gifted children.

Dear Parents:

The Howard County Middle School Report Card for 1976-1977 was developed to reflect a belief by middle school personnel that the marking system should indicate performance in relation to growth.

It is our belief that on the middle school level all students should be able to experience success. Therefore, we have attempted to assign pupils challenging tasks which are within the range of their abilities and are marking them on the basis of growth. We are reporting how well a pupil has completed the work assigned to him. We are not reporting how well he has achieved in relation to other students of his age group and grade.

A "Reading Level" section has been added to the report card. A check mark indicates your child's reading level as determined by standardized tests. Last Spring all present sixth and eighth grade pupils were administered the Iowa Tests of Basic Skills which are the tests used for this section. Seventh grade students have not been tested for two years. However, they will receive the Iowa tests this Spring. As a result the reading level section will not be checked for seventh graders or any other student who did not take the Iowa tests last year. Parents are advised not to expect a change in this section for subsequent marking periods unless the teacher notices a significant difference in his/her reading performance.

If you have additional questions regarding this report card, please call the school counselors or arrange an appointment with your child's teachers. As always, your suggestions and cooperation will be appreciated.
